



KS2 Data Analysis 2018

Pupils take national curriculum assessments in year 6 at the end of KS2, when most will reach age 11 by the end of the school year.

Pupils take tests (commonly referred to as SATs) in reading, maths and grammar, punctuation and spelling (GPS) and receive a teacher assessment (TA) in reading, writing, maths and science.

To reach the expected standard in each test subject, a pupil must achieve a scaled score of 100 or more.

Average progress from end of KS1 to the end of KS2

A score of 0 means that pupils do about **as well** as pupils with similar KS1 assessment scores in other schools. Therefore, pupils in our school do **significantly better** in reading and maths than similar pupils nationally
